- Michigan Corn Yields have increased over 8.4 percent!
- Michigan Wheat Yields have increased over 35.1 percent!
- Michigan soybean yields have *decreased* over 8.7 percent!

2010 Soybean Yield Contest

1. The fee per entry is \$25.00 for all Michigan soybean farmers.
2. All farmers that complete the contest will receive \$50.00 in Soy Biodiesel Bucks certificates.
3. Limit of two entries per farmer.
4. Entries will be grouped by soybean maturity. The five entry classes are listed below:
Class A: Group III Non-Irrigated
Class B: Group III Irrigated
Class C: Group II Non-Irrigated
Class D: Group II Irrigated
Class E: Group I
5. Planting forms and complete contest rules will be mailed to interested farmers after June 1, 2010.
6. The contest planting form and entry fee will be due by August 7, 2010.
7. The minimum field size is five acres and the harvest area must be at least two acres. Only one entry per field is permitted.
8. Harvest must be witnessed by an MSU Extension Educator, FFA Advisor, lender, farm manager or other impartial witness. Seed, fertilizer or chemical company representatives cannot sign the harvest form.

Why a Soybean Yield Contest?

1. Provide a fun incentive for Michigan farmers to increase soybean yields.
2. Use the contest to increase farmer attention to the agronomics of soybean production in Michigan.
3. Share the information learned by the participants to help all farmers raise higher yielding and more profitable soybeans through the Soybean 2010 project.

Prizes

- Each class winner will receive up to \$1,000.00 reimbursement for expenses to the 2011 Commodity Classic in Tampa, Florida from March 3 through March 5, 2011.
- Each class winner receives a trophy suitable for the farm office and a personalized contest winter jacket.
- Everyone who completes the contest will receive a personalized contest hat and their entry fee applied to a MSA membership.
- Prizes will be awarded at the 2010 Michigan Soybean Association annual meeting.
